
## WRITING CAREER OVERVIEW




## *Nature Boy*, 2005.

An historical novel, part fact, part fiction about a Swedish immigrant in the 1800s. Nelsen is an exact contemporary of Ned Kelly and he hid away on Mt Tallarook for fourteen years until he was discovered and sent to jail on a charge of vagrancy.

Jack Smythe says Einstein is wrong and he has a new theory to prove it. But now at 62 he's been unceremoniously dumped in a nursing home. It is a story about youth and aging, and the power of self redemption.

52 stories, one for each week of the year, each story exactly 365 words long and all divided into the four seasons. These fables dwell at the heart of modern living. There is a sense of things not quite right and a dalliance with subtle fears and uncertainties. Includes 52 illustrations that defy logic and categorisation.
